Foreword



2023 was a pivotal year in the implementation of the cooperation program between UNFPA and the Democratic Republic of Congo (CPD 2020-2024), given its alignment with UNFPA's global strategy 2022-2025 and its evaluation, after 4 years of implementation. In August 2023, a strategic dialogue was held with the UNFPA regional office and headquarters with a view to designing a new program cycle. A note blanche for the 6th program of cooperation between the DRC and UNFPA was drawn up to define the new vision for the country program, its strategic priorities and the paths to be followed to achieve transformative results.

The country office has stepped up its humanitarian actions as part of the scaling-up to level 3 of the UN agencies' humanitarian response, following an unprecedented protracted crisis caused by the fighting between the March 23 Movement (M23) and the Armed Forces of the Democratic Republic of Congo (FARDC), which has been raging in the eastern part of the country for several decades, compounded by epidemics and natural disasters. In addition, the last 6 months of 2023 were marked by presidential, legislative, provincial and municipal elections, as well as by MONUSCO's transition. This was a crucial period during which UNFPA, in collaboration with the government, carried out awareness-raising campaigns to encourage young people to campaign for non-violence during the electoral process.

At the level of UN system coordination, UNFPA has actively contributed to the elaboration of a Common Country Assessment and the evaluation of the current Cooperation Framework of the UN System and the DRC for the period 2020-2024

This summary gives an overview of the main progress made under the program during 2023, the main challenges, the lessons learned and the outlook for the final year of the cooperation framework and the coming years.

UNFPA noted with satisfaction the political advances that have enhanced the scope of its interventions within the framework of its mandate. These include the promulgation of the law on the creation, organization and operation of the DRC's national order of midwives, the organization of the first Mother and Newborn Week as part of the H6+ partnership, and the drafting of the annual report on the monitoring of maternal and perinatal deaths and the response to better coordinate actions to combat maternal mortality.

In addition, 2023 was marked by the strengthening of the coordination of actions to combat gender-based violence, the prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse, the establishment of integrated centers for the holistic care of survivors of sexual violence, and the strengthening of youth leadership through the adoption of innovative approaches, including the use of social media, all of which have helped to increase the empowerment of women and the access of adolescents and young people to quality reproductive health information and services

For all these achievements, the remarkable contribution of our donors has enabled UNFPA to intensify its interventions on behalf of the most disadvantaged populations. I would like to express my sincere thanks to the Congolese Government, Japan, the Kingdom of Norway, the Kingdom of Sweden, the World Bank, France, Belgium, Canada, USAID, KOICA and OCHA. I would also like to express my gratitude to our implementing partners, i.e. government structures, national and international non-governmental organizations and the private sector, for their collaboration and added value in achieving results during 2023.

As we move towards the end of the programming cycle, it is important to capitalise on all the achievements by documenting successful experiences and drawing all the lessons from them for the next cooperation program, because despite the progress made, the challenges remain enormous.

It is therefore with great eagerness and satisfaction that we share the progress made by our office during the year 2023, which I am convinced has contributed to making a positive difference in the lives of the people of the Democratic Republic of Congo. I wish you a warm welcome.

Main interventions

Family planning services

In the humanitarian context, in response to the various crises resulting from armed conflict and natural disasters, UNFPA acquired and distributed products (contraceptives, maternal and new bornhealth medicines including emergency reproductive health kits, dignity kits, tents and other medical materials and equipment) worth \$3,052,997, during the activation of level 3 of the humanitarian emergency response (Scale-Up), in Eastern DRC from June 16 to December 31, 2023.

Family planning has been integrated into resilience projects in partnership with FAO, WFP and UNICEF to benefit farmers living in rural areas. Supervisors of peasant organizations were trained in community-based contraceptive distribution n Mwenga, Kaniola, Walungu, Lemera, Ruzizi and Kalehe.

Supply chain management and Last Mile Assurance

- We supported the capacity building of health providers to create demand for and supply of family planning services to increase contraceptive prevalence in the provinces of Maniema, Kasaï, Tshopo, and Sankuru.
 - We provided family planning services in humanitarian situations to 30164 women and girls living in IDP sites in the provinces of North Kivu, South Kivu and Ituri, through mobile clinics and community-based distribution.
 - We innovated with the use of new technologies (Africhain mobile application) software developed by AfriYAN-DRC for efficient contraceptive supply chain management and data collection.
 - We pre-positioned and distributed contraceptive products, emergency reproductive health kits, dignity kits, tents and other maternal and newborn health medicines, especially in humanitarian and hard-to-reach areas.

Mobilizing resources for modern family planning commodities and supplies

The budget for the National Reproductive Health Program (PNSR) includes a budget line for the purchase of contraceptives and other reproductive health drugs, to which the government has committed to FP2030 and UNFPA's COMPACT 2023 to allocate US\$5 million each year for the purchase of contraceptives.

Main interventions

Leadership and advocacy for maternal health

- We organized the first ever Mother and Newborn Week as part of the H6+ partnership under the patronage of the distinguished First Lady of the DRC.
- We strengthened the technical and institutional capacities of health care facilities in the supported Health Zones, contributing to deliveries assisted by skilled birth attendants.
- An EmONC network has been set up in Maniema province, with the identification priority interventions for the network's operationalization validated by all the province's stakeholders.
- We trained two (2) surgical teams from the provinces of Lomami and Haut-Katanga in obstetric fistula repair, bringing to 22 the number of provinces with at least one surgical team capable of operating on obstetric fistula in routine mode.
- We pre-positioned reproductive health kits, dignity kits, tents, life-saving drugs including contraceptives, medical equipment and materials that

- helped to provide emergency response to the needs of women and girls of childbearing age living in IDP sites.
- We advocated and obtained the enacting of the law creating, organizing operationalizing the DRC's national midwifery order promulgated by the Head of State on December 4, 2023.
- We advocated and obtained the declaration in September 2023 by the Head of State of free maternity and newborn care for the province of Kinshasa to be gradually enrolled to the rest of the 26 provinces of DRC

Waternal and perinatal death surveillance and esponse

- We contributed in efforts to raise the skilled birth attendance from 85.9% in 2018 to 90.5% in 2023.
- We supported the national PMDSR (Perinatal maternal death surveillance and response) committees elaborating the annual report of 2022 on x maternal and perinatal death surveillance and response
- We strengthened provincial PMDSR committees provinces of the DRC

Main interventions

Leadership and Coordination

- To ensure repair for survivors of conflict-related sexual violence and other victims of serious crimes and crimes against humanity, the Fonds National de Réparation des Victimes (FONAREV) was created in July 2023.
- In addition, by presidential decree in 2023, the government institutionalized integrated multisector service centers for the holistic care of survivors of GBV.
- National GBV Coordination ensured the positioning of the fight against violence in the humanitarian programming cycle and in the context of scaling up the humanitarian response in the provinces of North Kivu, South Kivu and Ituri.
- Significant progress was recorded in the area of protection against sexual exploitation and abuse (PSEA) in the implementation of humanitarian and development projects thanks to the commitment of other institutions, notably the Ministries of Health, Social and Humanitarian

GBV/SGBV prevention

- A mechanism for alerting and referring cases of gender-based violence is operational through the 49 55 55 hotline.
- 3, 464 sensitive complaints relating to gender-based violence were processed through this hotline, including 755 from schools, 2,663 from the community and 27 in humanitarian situations.
- A training module for legal actors on legal aid and the complaints management mechanism in the fight against sexual abuse and exploitation has been developed.

Main interventions

With the aim of leaving no one behind, in 2023 UNFPA, with funding from Norway, supported the process of integrating comprehensive sexuality education into the National Program of Specific Branches of Special Education («NBSES» for short in French). This gave the opportunity to adolescents and young people living with disabilities to access information and receive education on sexual and reproductive health.

UNFPA has also supported the integration of comprehensive sexuality education into the national vocational training program.

UNFPA supported the civil society youth organizations in the prevention against violence campaign during the 2023 elections through:

- High-level international conference on the implementation of United Nations Security Council Resolution 2250 on youth, peace and security in 2023.
- 4 safe spaces for regular consultations, mechanisms and platforms on peace and security in communities
- Campaigns to combat fake news, hate speech, misogyny and discrimination on the Internet and in the media during the electoral process.
- Involvement and securing of formal commitment of more than 1,000 young IDPs in favor of intercultural social cohesion, on a community mechanism for conflict prevention and management in IDP camps.





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General Population and Housing Census (GPHC2)

- UNFPA provided technical support to the government in preparation for the second Population and Housing Census (2nd CPH), through the consolidation of methodological documents for census mapping, questionnaires, guidelines and IT applications.
- The National Institute of Statistics (INS for short in French) benefited from capacity building in terms of sharing of census experience and training in geo-spatial data analysis and census data visualization.

UNFPA helped strengthen the INS in developing methodological guidelines for producing vital statistics (on births, deaths, marriages, and divorces) and improving coordination and data sharing between the institute and relevant ministries.

- UNFPA contributed in the preparation of a Voluntary National Review (VNR) report on progress towards the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and DRC's participation in the High-Level Political Forum on the SDGs held in New York in July 2023.
- Rapid multi-sectoral assessments (RMAs) in humanitarian crisis situations were carried out on GBV risks, land and community conflicts (Kamonia, Kasaï Central and Kasaï Oriental, Rutshuru territory, Masisi, Mahagi, Nyiragongo, Kalehe).
 - The report on the ten-year review of the Addis Ababa Declaration on Population and Development (AADPD@10/ (ICPD@30) was drawn up. The country participated in the AADPD@10 review meeting and also supported the development of a demographic dividend roadmap for five provinces. In collaboration with the Ministry of Gender Equality, the office is improving the national database on gender-based violence.







Response to humanitarian crises

The Inter-Agency Standing Committee (IASC) activated the scaling-up of the L3 system in the DRC, following a prolonged and unprecedented crisis that has been raging in the eastern part of the DRC for several decades, compounded by epidemics and natural disasters. A fragile humanitarian situation that forced some 6.3 million displaced and disaster-stricken people into deplorable conditions.

To ensure a more effective, large-scale response, UNFPA aligned itself with this scaling-up and intensified its humanitarian interventions in the provinces of North Kivu, South Kivu and Ituri to urgently address the scale of unmet needs.

Humanitarian Respone In the area of Reproductive Health

- 60 mobile clinics were created to support access to reproductive health information and services, including family planning and the use of mobile ultrasound.
- 7 403 women gave birth in health facilities with maternity services supported by UNFPA
- 24 632 new acceptors of a modern short-acting contraceptive method were recruited through community-based distribution;
- 5 532 new acceptors of a modern long-term contraceptive method were recruited;
- 26 722 STI cases were managed using the syndromic approach;
- 16 399 births were assisted by qualified personnel;
- 2 569 cases of childbirth-related complications were referred to general hospitals, including 1,476 caesarean sections performed and managed;
- 34 448 prenatal consultations were carried out;
- 310 600 people were educated about RH, FP, GBV, HIV, etc;
- 322 370 male and female condoms were distributed;
- 9 686 individual delivery kits were distributed.

Partnership and use of NICTs for provision of quality maternal health in DRC

This innovation aims to improve the provision of maternal and neonatal health (MNH) services in rural areas through a public-private partnership using WhatsApp to monitor pregnant women in the provinces of Sankuru and Kasaï-Central, which face major challenges in terms of the availability of equipment and specialized staff to ensure the provision of quality MNH services.

Recourse to the expertise of the University of Kinshasa's Faculty

of Medicine for training providers in gynecological and obstetrical ultrasound.

Second Edition of the Henriette EKE Media Award

The second edition of the « **Prix Média Henriette Eke** » rewarded the 8 best journalistic productions addressing issues of sexual and gender-based violence, including cases of sexual exploitation, abuse and harassment in the DRC. The awards ceremony took place in December 2023 in Kinshasa.









Final evaluation of the 2020-2024 Country Program Document (CPD)

The year 2023 was marked by the kick off of the final evaluation of the cooperation program between the Democratic Republic of Congo and UNFPA for the period from 2020 to 2024. This independent evaluation began in September with external consultants. It followed the various phases required, including the start-up phase, the data collection phase and the reporting phase. The activity is being monitored by a reference group made up of representatives of state and non-state partners. The draft evaluation report is available and presents the results of the program as well as the lessons learned, which will help in the elaboration of the next CPD. The final version of the document will be available in 2024.

Designing the new cooperation program UNFPA-DRC (2025-2029)

Getting to the final year of the 5th cooperation program (2020-2024), the Congolese Government and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) embarked on the process of designing a new program that will define the main areas of UNFPA's support for the country's development for the period 2025-2029.


The process of developing the 6th DRC-UNFPA cooperation agreement comprises 5 main stages, from preparatory work (2023) to the production of the country program document (CPD), which will set out the program's main themes and priority activities.

Resource Mobilization and strategic partnerships

In 2023, UNFPA RDC mobilized a total

USD 11.6 millions as follows:

- **2,599,869 USD** from the United States,
- **6,336,003 USD** from the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF),
- 700,000 USD from the Humanitarian Fund
- 1,998,366 USD from the Central African Forest Initiative (CAFI) for cost extension.
- **2,000,000 EURO** from France



Resource mobilization challenges

The challenge of mobilizing resources and establishing partnerships remains significant. In terms of outlook, UNFPA DRC intends to proactively increase funding and expand strategic partnerships. The office also plans to diversify resource mobilization and strengthen relations with the private sector.





Human resources

The UNFPA office in the DRC operated in 2023 with a staff of around 167, all contracts types combined, with a vacancy rate of 10%.

To support the intensification of the humanitarian response, the office deployed more than 20 staff with different skills in the three Eastern provinces affected by level 3 humanitarian emergency. In addition, 30 midwives were deployed to various health centers to provide RH services with a view to reducing preventable maternal and newborn deaths.

The office organized capacity-building sessions for its staff and partners on Quantum and Quantum+, project management and results-based management.

During 2023, the office used interns to support programmatic, coordination and operations activities.



A total of 7 trainees, including two males and five females, completed 6-month internships, mainly in archive reconstitution, support for the recruitment process, assistance with file processing, management of the

Representative's agenda, processing of payments and participation in all activities relating to their field of internship.

2. Support mission to the Kaduna sub-office (Nigeria)


